

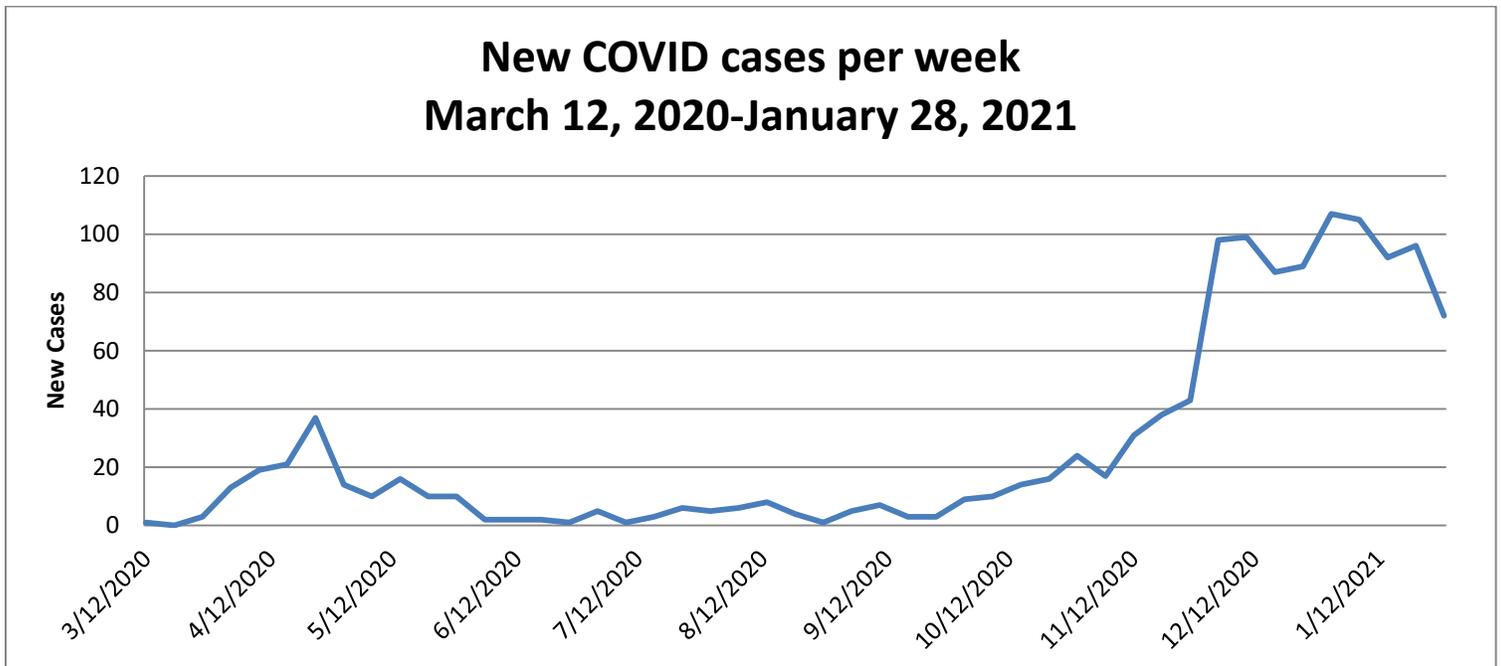



- **Update to temporary occupancy restrictions for specific sectors**

Given recent improvements in COVID-19 data in the state, some of the recent temporary occupancy restrictions in sectors listed below are being lifted. **These changes are effective Monday February 8th at 5:00 a.m.**

1. Lifting 25% Capacity Restriction

- a. All businesses in the list below, currently limited to 25% capacity, will return to 40% capacity, as previously allowed. (The sector-specific industry standards dated in December 2020 will apply.)
 - Arcades and Recreational Businesses
 - Driving and Flight Schools
 - Gyms/Health Clubs
 - Libraries
 - Museums
 - Retail
 - Offices
 - Places of Worship

- Lodging (common areas)
- Golf (indoor areas)
- Movie theaters (no more than 50 people per theater)
- b. Restaurants will now be limited to 40% of their seated capacity and, as under the 25% capacity rule, employees will not count toward the limit
- c. Close Contact Personal Services will now be limited to 40% capacity and, as under the 25% capacity rule, employees will be not count toward the limit
 - A limit of 5 people per 1000 sq. feet applies for smaller businesses without an available fire occupancy capacity
- d. There continues to be no capacity limits on manufacturing, construction, and laboratories—these sectors have never had capacity limits

2. Gatherings Order

- a. The gatherings limit will stay at 10 indoors, 25 outdoors

3. The Commonwealth remains in Phase 3 Step 1 of Reopening (Order No. 58)

- a. indoor performance venues and indoor recreation businesses like roller rinks and trampoline parks remain closed

4. All changes are effective Monday February 8th at 5:00 AM

• COVID-19 Vaccine Need-to-Know Details

** This information was last updated 1/23/21 and applies to the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines.*

➤ It is SAFE

The available COVID-19 vaccines are approved and recommended by the FDA and the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices following standard testing and approval processes.

By prioritizing resources and efforts, the vaccines were developed quickly and never at the expense of safety. For more on vaccine safety visit mass.gov/COVIDVaccineSafety

➤ It is FREE

The COVID-19 vaccine is being administered free of charge to all individuals by the federal government.

Insurance information may be asked for by those administering the vaccine in order to bill-back to insurance. However, you will not be charged. If you do not have insurance, you are still eligible to receive the vaccine free of charge.

➤ **You need TWO doses to be FULLY vaccinated**

Until you are fully vaccinated, you can still contract and spread COVID-19.

Not everyone will be vaccinated when you are. And while we know it dramatically reduces severe cases and symptoms, we are still learning about the protection that COVID-19 vaccines provide under real-life conditions. Continue to wear a mask, wash your hands, keep distance and avoid groups between doses and even after your second dose.

➤ **Your two doses need to be administered from the SAME SITE**

You must receive your second dose of the same vaccine at the same site as your first.

- Pfizer vaccine: 21 days following first dose
- Moderna vaccine: 28 days following first dose

Before leaving your first dose appointment, schedule or confirm how to setup your next appointment.


Massachusetts developed a phased COVID-19 vaccine distribution timeline focused on equity and safety.

The timeline focuses on maintaining health care system capacity, addressing inequities in health care access and the COVID-19 burden, and protecting vulnerable populations. When can I get a COVID-19 vaccine in MA?



- **Everyone in Phase 1 & individuals 75+ can get the COVID-19 vaccine**

Massachusetts has started to vaccinate against COVID-19. We continue to expand eligibility to more groups of people, **but vaccine supply is severely limited**. At this [website](#), you will find tools to help determine when you are eligible, how to find a vaccination location, and how to prepare for your appointment.
